

WOW, What a year! As the pandemic hit, we turned our focus on Covid-19 and what that means for the unique populations our members serve. Thanks to a joint effort by all our members we were able to immediately compile links to educational materials in multiple languages for Covid-19 and post on our website. We also published a perspective piece on Covid-19 in the Journal of Immigrant and Minority Health as well as a brochure for service providers on assessing barriers to following Covid-19 prevention guidance.

You would think that the pandemic would have slowed us down but 2020 was actually one of our most productive years! Our membership increased by a whopping 68% and we launched our Twitter account and immediately received over 1,000 followers. We kept up our webinars and added a two-day virtual course on how to perform a forensic evaluation for asylum seekers. And of course... We still held our annual conference. Let that sink in for a minute... The 2020 North American Refugee Health Conference was our most successful conference to date and it was held in the middle of a pandemic!

A sign that we are maturing as an organization is the creation of committees. In 2020 we launched our first committee: Research, Evaluation, and Ethics. Thanks to a dedicated group of Society members and non-members the committee has been very active and we expect to see some concrete results from this committee soon!

We are a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the healthcare of refugees and asylum seekers, as well as addressing equity in healthcare.

Our passionate members include medical providers, nurses, social workers, researchers, coordinators and many other professionals who spend much of their workday caring for newly-arriving refugees, asylum seekers and immigrants.

2020 activities



340 emails to over 4,106 professionals sharing educational resources, connecting people and answering questions.



Like many we pivoted to a virtual conference due to the pandemic. It was a great success! 726 attendees serving over 300,000 refugees joined us online in September for the 2020 North American Refugee Health Conference (pg. 8–9).



Thanks to generous donations, 36 previously resettled refugees training or working in the medical field received a scholarship to attend the 2020 NARHC (pg. 10).



In 2020 the Society grew by a whopping 68% – from 241 to 404 members by December (pgs. 6).



Nearly 1,000 individuals registered for our virtual education including a mental health webinar and our 2-day "Forensic Evaluation of Asylum Seekers" training cohosted with the Society of Asylum Medicine (pg. 10).



Overview

The North American Refugee Health Conference (NARHC) is recognized as the preeminent conference for healthcare and resettlement professionals working with refugee and asylum seeking populations. Attendees learn about best practices, hone their cultural humility, connect with like-minded professionals, reflect on the challenges and successes of the work they do, and develop a network of colleagues who are making a difference in their communities. NARHC alternates annually between the United States and Canada.

NARHC 2020 was scheduled for Cleveland. Like other conferences NARHC had to make the decision between cancelling or shifting online due to the pandemic. We're so glad we decided to go ahead with a virtual format! NARHC 2020 was a smashing success with 726 attendees, 200+ presentations and 36 scholarships awarded.

Scholarships for previously resettled refugees

The Society asked registrants of the 2020 North American Refugee Health Conference (NARHC) to donate money to help cover the cost of attending NARHC for a previously resettled refugee training or working in the medical field.

Thanks to your generosity, each person who applied and was eligible for our fund. This meant that 36 former refugees received scholarships to attend NARHC. Wow!

Forensic Evaluation of Asylum Seekers

Having a high-quality forensic evaluation can often mean the difference between an asylum seeker winning or losing their case. Healthcare professionals can make a powerful and unique contribution to individuals seeking asylum through their evaluations. However, not many professionals are formally trained.

In October 2020, we co-hosted a 2-day training with the Society of Asylum Medicine. 668 individuals registered and 200 participants

attended the live session to learn practical tips for performing objective assessments of physical, functional and psychological scars related to persecution and torture. These participants now possess the skills necessary for writing impactful medical-legal affidavits.

Student Ambassadors

The Society had a group of university interns research and develop the outlines for a student ambassador program for students ranging from undergraduates to graduate students representing a range of disciplines who are united in their interest in refugee and immigrant health. The goal of the Society student ambassador program is to develop students' refugee and immigrant health knowledge, skills, and connect them with local and regional experts. The Society is now looking for interested universities who would like to pilot the program. Contact us for more details!


